Talks are scheduled for 9.30am, followed by morning tea

April 22nd - Patrick Heaven: A History of South Africa –Pt. 4: “The Demise of Apartheid”.
Patrick continues his series on the history of South Africa.

April 29th - Tom Hunt: ‘Earthstory’ A look at Earth’s past (and future?) It turns out that the “ancient history” in our text books isn’t really so long ago, and our world wasn’t always like it is today. Can we see into the future from studying Earth’s past?

May 6th - Russell Couch: First Nations' Land Rights and Wrongs. A brief look at what works and doesn't work in the return of lands to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, using NSW and Federal land rights frameworks as examples (Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983; National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974; Native Title Act 1993). An ex-bureaucrat / non-lawyer's views.

May 13th - Judith Oyston OAM: Roses. Judith has had a long association with the National Rose Society of Australia and the Rose Society of New South Wales and was awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) for service to horticulture. She will discuss East Coast Roses and Companion Planting.

May 20th - Alain Adolphe: Uniting NSW/ACT. Engaging with seniors on options designed to keep them at home, independent and living their best quality of life.

May 27th - National Reconciliation Week Angus Crichton, Environmental Services Manager, Illawarra Local Land Council – **Caring for Country.**

June 3rd - Graeme Sutherland. Healthier Illawarra Men. Graeme will discuss the role of the group which is to raise awareness of men’s health issues, including mental health, and to encourage men to be more proactive regarding their own health; as well as to raise awareness of appropriate behaviours to prevent domestic, family and sexual violence.

June 10th - Roy Lawrie. Crossing the Gobi .

June 17th - Frank Nowlan. “The Australian Frontier Wars and a Little More”. This talk looks at the modus operandi of the frontier wars with our First Nations people, with some examples of battles and a visit to Truth Telling.

June 24th - Stephen Brown. Russia and Ukraine. How will the war end? The talk examines the possible outcomes of the present war in Ukraine.

Note: *each session this term is a group participation session on a broad-ranging topic. If you wish to include a contribution, please let Toni know in advance what specific aspect of the topic you will be presenting, and roughly how many minutes you'd like to be allocated, so that the program is balanced.* Ideas for future terms and sessions are welcome at any time.

APRIL 22

GASLIGHT (USA 1944 114 mins). Directed by George Cukor. This psychological thriller stars Charles Boyer, Ingrid Bergman, Joseph Cotten and Angela Lansbury in her film debut. Adapted from Patrick Hamilton's play *Gas Light* (1938), it concerns a husband who persuades his wife she is insane. **RICK**

APRIL 29

ROPE *(USA 1948 80 mins) Directed by Alfred Hitchcock this psychological crime thriller is again based on a play by Patrick Hamilton and stars James Stewart. It is the first of Hitchcock's Technicolor films and is notable for taking place in real time. **RICK**

MAY 6

THE MAN WHO SHOT LIBERTY VALANCE (USA 1962 123 mins). Directed by John Ford. John Wayne and James Stewart in their first time together star in this black and white Western. Senator Ransom Stoddard recounts why he is known for killing local goon, Liberty Valance. **RICK**

MAY 13

BIRD (USA 1988. 160 mins.) Directed by Clint Eastwood, this biographical musical drama is about the jazz saxophonist Charlie "Bird" Parker. Forest Whitaker is Parker and Diane Verona is his wife, Chan Parker. It is constructed as a montage of scenes from Parker's life, from his childhood in Kansas City to his early death at 34. **ROB**

MAY 20

DEAD MAN *USA 1995 120 mins). Directed by Jim Jarmusch. This is an acid Western starring among many others, Johnny Depp, Billy Bob Thornton, Iggy Pop, John Hurt and Robert Mitchum in his final performance. Set in late C19, accountant William Blake is on the run after a murder. He meets an enigmatic Native American spirit-guide, "Nobody", who believes the fugitive is a reincarnation of the visionary English poet. **ROB**

MAY 27

ARRIVAL (USA 2016. 116 mins). Directed by Denis Villeneuve, this science fiction drama was based on Ted Chiang's novella "Story of your Life". It stars Amy Adams as a linguist trying to communicate with extraterrestrials to avoid war. The human perception of linear time and the concept of memories of the future are involved. **ROB**

JUNE 3

NOTORIOUS (USA 1946 101 mins.) Directed by Alfred Hitchcock, starring Cary Grant, Ingrid Bergman & Claude Rains, this film noir follows a German expatriate who sets out on a mission to spy on a group of Nazis. It is widely considered a masterpiece for its sophisticated suspense, mature themes and iconic performances.

JUNE 10

THE NEW BOY (Australia 2023 96 mins). Directed by Warwick Thornton and starring Aswan Reid, Deborah Mailman, Wayne Blair and Cate Blanchett. An aboriginal boy arrives at a remote monastery run by a renegade nun. Some see him as a threat when he appears to display special powers that work miracles. Beautifully filmed by Warwick Thornton. **ROB**

JUNE 17

A COMPLETE UNKNOWN (USA 2024 141 mins)Directed by James Mangold. Starring Timothée Chalamet, this biographical film tracks the early career of singer-songwriter, Bob Dylan from the time he arrives in New York of the early 1960s, at the age of 19. **ROB**

JUNE 24

SNATCH (UK 2000 102 mins.)Written and directed by Guy Ritchie, this crime comedy features an ensemble cast including Benicia del Toro, Dennis Farina and Brad Pitt. In London a gang disguised as Orthodox Jews steals a diamond. It then gets mixed up with a small-time boxing promoter and chaos ensues.

RECENT PUBLICATIONS of interest

Israel on the Brink – 8 Steps for a better future by Ilan Pappé (OneWorld, 2025)

A renowned Israeli-British historian argues Israel is fracturing, and considers the issues that must be centered for a peaceful future for Palestinians and Jews alike.

Pappé argues that with the 2022 election of the most right-wing government in Israel's history, the October 7 Hamas attack on Israel, and the subsequent Israeli war on Gaza, political fractures inherent in the Jewish state have expanded dangerously—and will potentially lead to Israel's collapse. With the goal of working towards a transition that is as peaceful as possible, Pappé sets out his thoughts about the risks and opportunities emerging from this historical moment. Eight “mini-revolutions,” he argues, will be necessary for this more hopeful future to emerge. In a final chapter, Pappé applies a speculative fiction approach to achieving a single democratic state for both Palestinians and Israelis, called Palestine, in 2048.

Human/Nature – On Life in a Wild World . by Jane Rawson (Newsouth, 2025)

A lyrical work of creative non-fiction, a wide-ranging philosophical musing, an exploration of how we think about the natural world in the way we do. If you have ever asked yourself whether humans are ruining nature, whether there is a better way for us to belong, or whether it's possible to love both the environment and your cat, you're not alone. This contemplative book is for anyone who has ever wondered where they fit in the natural world.
